PURPOSE OF REPORT/BACKGROUND

At the July 2021 Ordinary Council Meeting the following Notice of Motion was resolved:

- A. That Council establish suitable local office spaces at Springfield Central, Redbank Plains and Rosewood Libraries for use by Councillors to meet with local residents, businesses, and community organisations.

These spaces will be available on a permanent basis:

- To ensure Councillors maintain a presence and are available in the community they represent to hear about local issues important to residents and to make it easier for community members to provide feedback on these issues and the performance of Council
- To improve access, availability and facilitation of meetings for residents with their elected representatives

- To provide increased confidentiality for residents and allow for improved security of personal information to guard against loss, unauthorised access, or other forms of misuse.
- B. That Council implement these spaces using existing infrastructure, without additional commercial lease.

At the August 2021 Ordinary Council Meeting the following Notice of Motion Response was resolved:

- A. That Council note that officers have been working to assess and document the implications of the Council's resolution on 22 July 2021.
- B. That a Councillor workshop be held for Councillors on 7 September 2021 to discuss the implications that will be advised by officers and to consider the preferred approach to local office space in existing Council facilities.
- C. That following a workshop, a report be presented no later than the October 2021 Ordinary Council Meeting with relevant options.
- D. That officers continue to support Councillors wishing to utilise the existing spaces on an as required basis in the short term.

The Councillor Workshop was held on Tuesday 7 September 2021.

This report serves as that requested to be provided in October 2021.

Agreeable arrangements have been made at Rosewood Library and Redbank Plains Library servicing Councillor needs within the Division 1 and Division 4 areas.

To date no arrangement has been achieved within the Springfield Central Library or at another facility within Division 2. A number of options have been reviewed by Officers and Division 2 Councillors, however they have so far proven to be impractical or cost prohibitive.

Officers and the Division 2 Councillors will continue to work on achieving a suitable solution.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This is a report concerning a review of opening hours at Rosewood Library resulting in a proposed change to opening hours.

In response to community feedback directly to library staff and via the CES portal, community consultation was undertaken via an online and hard copy survey to determine the community's needs and preferences.

RECOMMENDATION/S

That Council endorse the proposed changes to opening hours at Rosewood Library to be effective from 4 January 2022.

RELATED PARTIES

PURPOSE OF REPORT/BACKGROUND

Rosewood Library's opening hours are currently:

Sunday	Closed
Monday	9am – 5pm
Tuesday	9am – 5pm
Wednesday	9am – 5pm
Thursday	9am – 5pm
<u>Friday</u>	<u>12pm – 7pm</u>
Saturday	9am – 12pm

Feedback from the Rosewood community to library staff and through the CES portal has indicated that the community would like access to the library on a Friday morning. It is the practice of some members of the Rosewood community to travel into the John Street precinct on a Friday morning for purchases, accessing supplies and undertake business. This

is when they would like to access the resources and services available at the Rosewood Library.

Ipswich Libraries conducted a survey in September – October 2021 with 213 responses and the results included:

Question: Which evening would you prefer the library stayed open later?

Response: 68% preferred Friday

Question: Would you visit the library on Friday morning if it was open?

Response: 41% Yes and 27% Maybe

It is recommended to extend the Rosewood Library opening hours on a Friday to open three hours earlier at 9:00am increasing opening hours from 42 to 45 hours per week. Through rescheduling staff and altering when tasks are completed this increase in service will not require any additional FTE.

The proposed Rosewood Library hours are:

Sunday	Closed
Monday	9am – 5pm
Tuesday	9am – 5pm
Wednesday	9am – 5pm
Thursday	9am – 5pm
<u>Friday</u>	<u>9am – 7pm</u>
Saturday	9am – 12pm

It is proposed that the change of hours would commence on Tuesday 4 January 2022 following a communication campaign to ensure that the Rosewood community is informed of the increase in library opening hours.

Additional feedback from the survey was that the Rosewood community would like to see extended hours on Saturday and opening hours on Sunday.

Extending the Rosewood Library opening hours on a Saturday would require additional staff resources and could not be resourced by the current FTE. Opening an additional two (2) hours from 12pm – 2pm would cost approximately \$38,649 per annum.

Opening the Rosewood Library on a Sunday from 10am – 1pm would require additional staff resources and could not be resourced by the current FTE. Opening for three (3) hours on Sunday would cost approximately \$23,208 per annum.

RISK MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS

The risk associated with increasing Library opening hours is the increased demand on resources. This has been managed by rescheduling and adjusted rostering of resources.

The risk of not increasing Library opening hours in response to feedback from the community relates too Council's reputation and commitment in iFuture Corporate Plan "The community feels heard and engaged and we close the loop with our consultation".

The increase in Rosewood Library opening hours can be achieved without any increase in FTE due to rescheduling staff hours and rosters, prioritising front of house service delivery and efficiencies identified through process improvement.

COMMUNITY AND OTHER CONSULTATION

Ipswich Libraries conducted an online, hard copy and face-to-face survey of members and potential members in response to the community feedback via staff interactions and CES portal regarding Rosewood Library opening hours.

213 people responded to the survey and the results demonstrated that the community wanted the Rosewood Library open on Friday mornings and that the late evening remain as Friday until 7pm.

- Branch Services Coordinators
- Customer Experience Manager
- Customer Services and Support Manager
- Manager, Libraries and Customer Services

CONCLUSION

In response to community feedback and consultation we are proposing that Rosewood Library opening hours are extended on a Friday. It is proposed that the library open an additional 3 hours on a Friday morning from 9am.

While community feedback indicated a preference for the Library to open longer on a Saturday and to introduce opening on a Sunday we do not recommend extending hours over weekends at this time. A further review should be conducted in late 2022 to determine if the future needs of the community.

The Ipswich City Council - City Events Plan aims to attract, support and produce a diverse program of annual events that engage the community, promote Ipswich as a destination, drive visitation and positively impact on business and industry.

SPARK Ipswich was designed and delivered as the reimagined Ipswich Festival, an 11-day city-wide event celebrating the people, places, arts and culture of Ipswich. The 2021 program delivered up fresh, new festival content. Music, comedy, arts, exhibitions, circus, projection, culture, cabaret, technology, collaboration and discussion took over the City from 9 to 19 July.

Key activations such as Refraction (art, light and water installation), deLight (art, heritage and projection installation) and Pixel (art, light and digital installation) were the first of their kind to be presented in Ipswich.

Some of the key figures relating to SPARK Ipswich Festival 2021 are:

- 16 event locations across every Division of the Ipswich LGA
- 91 event sessions
- 330 artists and art workers – 189 from the Ipswich LGA
- 33,661 event attendees – 26% from outside the Ipswich LGA
- \$318,728 total direct and incremental visitor expenditure

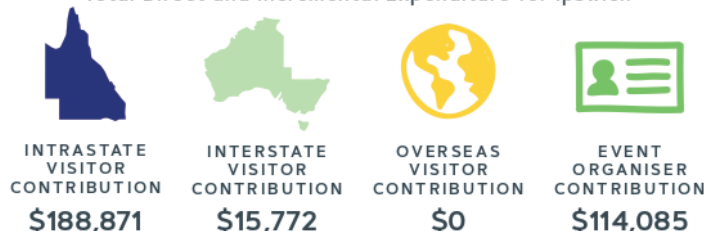

Total Direct and Incremental Expenditure for Ipswich



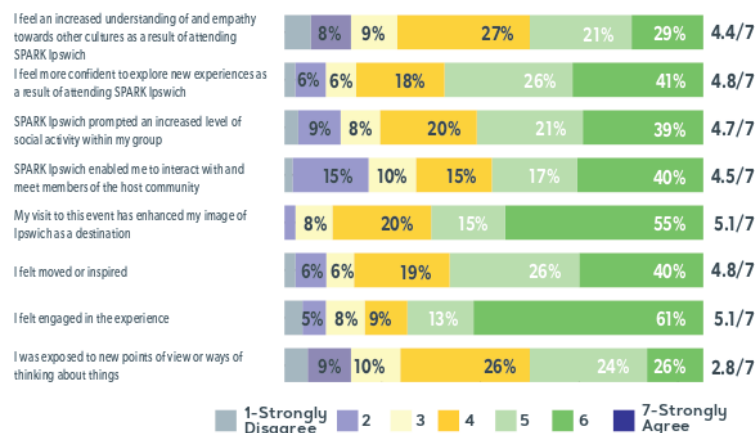

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This is a report concerning the community participation in Council's Kids Go Wild – Outdoor Recreation Program in the September/October 2021 school holidays. Kids Go Wild – Outdoor Recreation provided free 'come and try' style outdoor recreation activities, including canoeing, birdwatching and fishing. Activities were hosted in a variety of Ipswich's parks and conservation estates to encourage both physical activity and participation in outdoor recreation. Following positive community response to the activities and feedback data, Council is planning to host another program in the April 2022 school holidays with additional activities to those delivered during the recent school holidays.

RECOMMENDATION/S

That the Kids Outdoor Recreation Program Evaluation report be received and the contents noted.

PURPOSE OF REPORT/BACKGROUND

Kids Go Wild – Outdoor Recreation is an Ipswich City Council program introduced in 2021, for delivery during the September/October school holidays. The program aimed to encourage and support families to participate in outdoor recreation by providing free, beginner level 'come and try' activities for the community. Sessions included canoeing, mountain biking, day bushwalks, night bushwalks, birdwatching, family yoga and fishing. The program was in addition to *Active Breaks*, Council's existing school holiday program providing free activities for more traditional sports and physical activities.

Kids Go Wild – Outdoor Recreation program goals were:

- To support the community's confidence to participate in outdoor recreation
- Promote and activate local parks, open spaces and conservation estates as places for outdoor recreation
- Encourage physical activity during the school holidays
- Receive 70% attendance rate from session bookings.

This program also presented an opportunity to adjust the manner in which Council has traditionally promoted and marketed these activities. Given the age profile of the target audience, the marketing took on a less formalised content, instead making use of playful typefaces, social influenced boomerang styles and applicable emojis. This shift in style proved successful with a high level of engagement. The campaign goals were comfortably achieved with activities booking out - strongly influenced by providing the audience content in a format they wanted to consume in addition to a well-themed list of events.

There were 159 participants from 128 families that participated in a *Kids Go Wild – Outdoor Recreation* activity. The most popular sessions were canoeing, birdwatching and bushwalking. Unfortunately, during the second week, wet weather cancelled the mountain biking classes, one birdwatching activity, and influenced attendance at the yoga and day bushwalks.

The level of feedback received from participants and instructors provided valuable insight into and for future planning. *Kids Go Wild – Outdoor Recreation* attracted a diverse range of participant ages, genders and provided the opportunity for families to be active together. Bushwalking was a confidence boosting activity for many parents who hadn't explored White Rock Conservation Estate or Castle Hill Blackstone Reserve previously. Birdwatching was a broader activity that supported participants who may not be attracted to the more traditional formalised sports. Canoeing was viewed as a fun activity that is often expensive to participate in and normally offered at coastal locations.

One of the fundamental challenges presented as a result of providing a free activities program is that actual participant numbers have varying levels of non-attendance, despite registrations, confirmation emails and reminders.

Council intends to review this program for the April 2022 school holidays, to provide a similar if not enhanced range of activities for the community.

A total \$3,360 was spent on delivering the September/October Kids Go Wild – Outdoor Recreation program – costs included instructors, equipment and marketing. This came from a total \$7,500 allocation in the approved 2021-2022 Community and Cultural Services operating budget.

Outdoor recreation activities generally cost Council more than traditional physical activity sessions, due to the risk assessments, equipment costs and expertise involved in delivering these sessions.

COMMUNITY AND OTHER CONSULTATION

Quantitative registration and participation data was captured at all sessions. Qualitative feedback was sought from instructors and participants. Social media data was also collated via our marketing and will be used to assist in future *Kids Go Wild – Outdoor Recreation* programming.

CONCLUSION

Kids Go Wild – Outdoor Recreation in September/October 2021 generated positive participation with 159 participants. The high registrations and attendance data demonstrates a strong level of community interest and demand for family outdoor recreation activities. Council is planning to develop and deliver an expanded program in the April 2022 school holidays and beyond into the 2022-2023 financial year.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This is a report concerning the first quarter allocation of Council's Community Funding and Support Programs from 1 July 2021 to 30 September 2021.

In the 2021-2022 financial year Council allocated a total of \$829,415.70 to support the Ipswich community through the Community Funding and Support Programs.

In the first quarter, from 1 July 2021 to 30 September 2021, Council allocated \$356,729.50 to 81 Ipswich community groups, sporting organisations, artists, and wildlife carers.

All successful applicants and projects are detailed in Attachment 1 and also reported online at www.ipswich.qld.gov.au/services/funding-and-support in accordance with Council's principles of transparency and the Community Funding and Support Policy.
