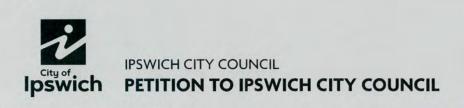

Maureen was deeply involved in the Ipswich Catholic Community, particularly at St Mary's Parish, contributing significantly to the spiritual and social fabric of our local area.

Fondly remembered for her impeccable and stylish dress sense, Maureen enjoyed her Saturday morning routine of walking from the Commercial Hotel through Bottle Alley to the Ipswich train station, heading into Brisbane to shop. Despite her quiet and reserved nature, Maureen was always ready to lend a helping hand to those in need.

I acknowledge Maureen Williams' lasting contribution of friendship, support and service to the Ipswich community and extend my heartfelt sympathy to her family, friends, and all who knew her.

#### CONDOLENCE MOTION - COUNCIL ORDINARY MEETING 30 JULY 2025

Liza Sandoy Tully was born in the Philippines on the 4<sup>th</sup> August 1965 and passed away peacefully at the Mater Private Hospital at South Brisbane on 22 July 2025.

She came to Australia after marrying Paul in Metro Manila in June 1998.

Liza was married to Paul for 27 years and was the mother of John Paul, 26 and James, 23.

Liza became involved across Ipswich over almost three decades with the Filipino community, schools, the church and numerous community organisations. She worked at the Salvation Army at Riverview and was loved by all.

She is best known to many for helping flood victims in 2011, even though the Tully family lost their own home at Goodna in the flood. Liza also helped many flood victims in 2022.

Over the years, she also quietly took into her home victims of domestic violence, sometimes for long periods, but never sought any accolades or recognition for this.

Two years ago, Liza's health started to slowly deteriorate but she remained bright and optimistic, always speaking kindly about others. She never complained about her illness.

Liza was always smiling, caring, understanding, considerate and generous to all whom she met in the community.

The pride of her life were her two sons – John Paul who graduated with a Bachelor of Laws Degree and became a lawyer at the age of 22 and James who graduated with a Bachelor of Mathematics in 2022.

Liza's family back home in the Philippines always remained a priority in her life, alongside her Australian family.

Liza was always a tower of strength to Paul over 27 years in both his personal and professional life.

Liza was admitted to the Mater Private Hospital in the early hours of Thursday, 10 July 2025, just a few short hours after she witnessed Queensland win the State of Origin against New South Wales.

That was to be the last night she ever spent with Paul at Augustine Heights – their home for 14 years.

	The already funded upgrades to the Warrego Highway, particularly between Dinmore to Helidon Spa, and upgrades to the Cunningham Highway need to be accelerated to restore their full functionality as the primary freight and commuter link between the south-east and the communities of the Lockyer Valley, Darling Downs, South West Queensland and New South Wales.		
What is the desired outcome sought? (required) 200 word limit	The Warrego and Cunningham Highways are among Queensland's busiest, linking Brisbane, Ipswich, Toowoomba, and southern markets. The Warrego's Dinmore to Helidon Spa stretch faces efficiency and safety issues, including fatigue cracks and brittle steel on the Bremer River Bridge, with load and speed limits in place for two years, and the Mount Crosby Road Interchange closure after a 2025 bridge strike. The Cunningham Highway, critical for accessing RAAF Base Amberley—Australia's largest defence force base with over 5,000 personnel—and connecting to New South Wales, requires urgent upgrades to improve freight and commuter safety.  In June 2024, \$277 million was committed for the Mount Crosby Road Interchange and \$85 million for Bremer River

Bridge repairs, with previous allocations made for Cunningham Highway safety upgrades, including key intersections. This motion seeks to accelerate these funded upgrades to both highways to address congestion, safety, and economic risks, ensuring resilience against competing 2032 Games infrastructure priorities.

Enhanced highways will support freight networks, defence operations, and regional connectivity for Queensland's communities

### **Background** (required) 350 word limit

The Warrego and Cunningham Highways are Queensland's critical commuter and freight corridors, with the Warrego handling up to 60,000 vehicles daily, 20% heavy vehicles, and the Cunningham serving as the primary access to RAAF Base Amberley, Australia's largest defence force base by personnel, and a key freight link to New South Wales.

The Warrego's Dinmore to Helidon Spa stretch faces significant issues, including fatigue cracks and brittle steel in the Bremer River Bridge (westbound) since August 2023, resulting in load limits (42.5-tonne restriction for Class 1 OSOM vehicles) and speed reductions (60 km/h westbound, 70 km/h eastbound). On 16 May 2025, a truck carrying wind turbine parts crashed into the Mount Crosby Road Interchange, closing the Warrego Highway for days and the southbound interchange lane for nearly a month, with a 20 km/h speed limit and 30-tonne weight limit still applied.

The Mount Crosby Road Interchange has long experienced significant issues resulting in traffic congestion and safety concerns for the Warrego Highway, particularly during peak periods. These recent incidents have only compounded these issues leading to further delays.

The Cunningham Highway faces similar congestion and safety challenges, particularly near Amberley, impacting freight and defence logistics.

The Australian and Queensland governments have committed \$277 million for the Mount Crosby Road Interchange, \$85 million for Bremer River Bridge repairs, and \$212.5 million for Cunningham Highway safety upgrades, including key intersections. These incidents highlight the urgent need to accelerate funded upgrades to both highways to ensure safety, efficiency, and resilience, supporting Queensland's freight network and regional economies. This motion seeks to expedite these critical improvements.

Case Study: Economic risk of current constraints to the Warrego Highway (Dinmore to Helidon Spa)

Case Study: Economic and Strategic Importance of Warrego and Cunningham Highways

The Warrego and Cunningham Highways are vital to Queensland's economy and national freight network. The Warrego, a key east-west corridor, connects primary producers and industries in southern Queensland to the Port of Brisbane, handling \$50 billion in annual trade, including 95% of Queensland's containerized freight and 50% of agricultural exports. It links to Toowoomba Wellcamp Airport and supports drive based tourism to outback regions.

The Cunningham Highway is equally critical, providing direct access to RAAF Base Amberley, Australia's largest defence force base with over 5,000 personnel, and serving as a primary freight route to New South Wales.

The Dinmore to Helidon Spa stretch of the Warrego and the Ipswich to Warwick section of the Cunningham are gateways to south-east Queensland, where congestion and safety issues, like the 2023 Bremer River Bridge restrictions and 2025 Mount Crosby crash, disrupt freight and commuter flows.

These highways connect to key north-south routes to Sydney, Melbourne, and Darwin, and intrastate routes to Rockhampton and Townsville. Ipswich City Council believes accelerating funded upgrades to both highways will benefit numerous Queensland councils, enhancing connectivity, supporting defence operations, and ensuring economic resilience

It is Ipswich City Council's perspective that this motion would seek to benefit a large number of Queensland councils that rely heavily on the Warrego and Cunningham Highways as key connections to Brisbane and South East Queensland more broadly, and we welcome the support of the LGAQ in advocating for the acceleration of these critical upgrades.

- Matter on Notice Invasive Weed Control Bremervale Park
   Councillor Pye Augustine queried the management of invasive weeds at Bremervale Park, namely the castor oil plant and ivy weed.

General Manager, Asset and Infrastructure Services to provide the committee with a response on how Council is managing weeds at the Bremervale Park site.

#### **RESPONSE:**

Email advice sent to Councillors on Thursday, 14 August 2025

Council Officers have undertaken an inspection of weeds at Bremervale park. Cat's Claw Creeper was not identified however Balloon Vine and Castor Oil were both identified. Castor Oil is a prolific environmental weed of creek banks (i.e. riparian areas), dry riverbeds, waterways, roadsides, railways, disturbed sites, gardens and neglected suburban areas and often outcompetes growth of native vegetation which can lead to erosion, unstable creek banks and reduced habitat.

Councils Biosecurity Plan (Waterways and wetland health improvement) identifies both Balloon Vine and the Castor Oil plant as not being restricted or prohibited matter. As such, active weed control is undertaken within the programmed maintenance component of the parkland, however it's not actively managed within the bushland edge component. At this stage Council does not have plans to treat weeds within the bushland edge component.

## **Economic and Cultural Development Committee of 22 July 2025**

## 4.1. MATTERS ON NOTICE

Councillor David Martin queried the rectification of the road pavers in the Nicholas Street Precinct as well as the dirt section near the waterplay area where grass seems difficult to grow.

Councillor Andrew Antoniolli queried the colours of the pavers on the road edges in the Nicholas Street Precinct in relation to safety as well as the visibility of the block seats in front of the council building and in front of Gelatissimo and whether possible design changes would improve visibility.

Chief Executive Officer to provide an operational update to Councillors in respect of the following matters in the Nicholas Street Precinct:

- the rectification of pavers
- the dirt section near the waterplay area where grass seems difficult to grow
- options for improved visibility of the road edges and block seats.

**RESPONSE** (provided via email on Friday, 15 August 2025)

#### Nicholas Street Mall pavers

Council engaged directly with a well-known builder, streetscape and landscape contractor in 2019 using a standard Design and Construct contract (AS4300), with an external project manager and external landscape architectural practice. Based on available information the paver and adhesive specification complied with all necessary and applicable standards. Once complete the roadway stayed largely unused for a couple of years whilst the wider precinct revitalisation took place. It wasn't until June 2021 that 1 Nicholas Street and the roadway opened for full use (although the road did part open in November 2020 but was predominantly pedestrianised). The contractor had completed their works by early 2020 which meant that the defect liability period (DLP) of one (1) year was passed before the road came into full use. Given that the DLP had expired before issues with the

pavers emerged, it has been difficult and protracted to pursue warranty claims with the original contractor.

A separate portion of roadway was constructed by the contractor who built the 1 Nicholas Street Administration Building as it is linked into Tulmur Place. This also suffered some damage and movement and has been rectified by that separate contractor.

During mid to late 2024, council engaged a different contractor to commence a paver rectification process. The roadway had become a safety issue and the visual/noise detracted from the precinct's amenity. The works undertaken by newly engaged contractor has included sections of pavers being removed, cleaned, some replaced and re-laid. The paver rectification process will be ongoing as part of our maintenance procedure. Future maintenance will require future road closures as the adhesives require twenty-four hours to set free of water and vehicular movement. The maintenance budget is sufficient to undertake any works. Assuming a more reliable result is received through the new contractor that has been engaged this will be monitored for a period of time prior to considering re-laying or replacement with another road surface. Should the issue continue through this coming Summer and storm season then this replacement may have to be budgeted in the FY2026/27 budget.

## Grassed area adjacent to water play in Tulmur Place

Regarding the grassed area adjacent to the water play that is struggling to survive, the team are engaging with internal stakeholders to procure a product suitable for the ground conditions and relating water spray, noting the chlorine content and location are not conducive to grass growth.

## Tulmur Place concrete bollards and road edges

Nicholas Street and the surrounding public realm are all designed and built to ensure that they are code compliant. The concrete bollards in the shape of blocks are designed to restrict car movement into Tulmur Place. Where there have been slips on some kerbs, white and/or gritted paint to delineate and reduce slips has been applied in some areas. #### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

This is a monthly report by the Chief Executive Officer focusing on a summary of organisational performance in the areas of workplace health and safety, progress in the delivery of Council's Corporate and Operational Plans, our people and culture, financial management, capital program delivery, flood recovery, external funding, significant risks and legal matters.

This report is for the month of July 2025. The report for this period highlights current significant matters and progress on key performance indicators.

## **BACKGROUND**

## 1. Current Significant Matters

## Tallegalla Cemetery upgrades and expansion

Council has completed a \$2.3 million upgrade and expansion of Tallegalla Cemetery ahead of its 150th anniversary. The project included road improvements, landscaping, new amenities, and a memorial walking path, all designed to support future growth while preserving the site's heritage. Community feedback guided enhancements such as seating, shelters, signage, and drainage upgrades. This work is part of a broader master plan across five council-owned cemeteries to accommodate Ipswich's projected population growth and ensure respectful spaces for remembrance.

## Citywide safety inspections of footpaths

Council is conducting a citywide footpath condition assessment from July to mid-August, inspecting over 300km of pathways. Specialist contractors are using slow-moving, quad bikestyle vehicles equipped with cameras to capture images of footpath surfaces. These vehicles are clearly marked and operate with caution to ensure pedestrian safety. The assessment aims to identify areas needing maintenance or upgrades, inform future capital works planning, and support safe, accessible pedestrian infrastructure across the city.

#### **Civic Centre Turns 50**

In 1975, a striking new architectural landmark emerged in Ipswich, contrasting the city's traditional heritage buildings. The Ipswich Civic Centre, with its bold geometric design and white façade, quickly became a cultural focal point. Over the past 50 years, it has hosted thousands of performances in the George Hogg Auditorium, supporting both emerging and established artists. Beyond the arts, the venue has served as a gathering place for weddings, school formals, graduations, and community events. Its 50th anniversary was celebrated with a week of performances featuring local talent and well-known entertainers. As part of the \$3.8 million granted to Council by the Federal Government through the Urban Precincts and Partnerships Program, a plan to upgrade the Civic Centre is under development, with the aim of ensuring its continued role as a vibrant hub for artistic and community life in Ipswich.

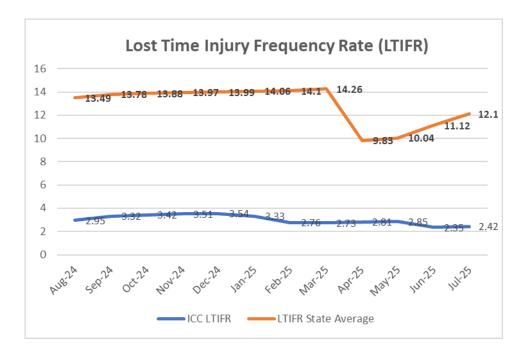
## New Traffic Lights improve safety at Karrabin

A major safety upgrade at the intersection of Keswick Road, Wulkuraka Connection Road, and Butterfield Road in Karrabin was completed, improving traffic flow and pedestrian safety in a growing area of Ipswich. The \$1 million project, partially funded by a Queensland Government grant, included the installation of traffic signals, street lighting, 120 metres of footpath, and line-marking. Additional works involved kerb ramps, landscaping, turfing, and the replacement of a boundary fence. Delays occurred due to the connection of lighting and signals. The upgrade addressed previous crash risks and supported increased traffic volumes, particularly around school pick-up and drop-off times, enhancing safety and operational efficiency in line with council's transport planning.

## Landmark conservation agreement enhances protection of Ipswich koalas

Koalas and other native wildlife on a private property in Purga received enhanced protection through the city's first Voluntary Conservation Covenant between Council and the landholders. The covenant, binding under Queensland's Land Title Act 1994, permanently secured 9.16 hectares of ecologically significant land for conservation. The property, adjacent to federally recognised Areas of Regional Koala Significance, supports a range of native species including echidnas, bandicoots, sugar gliders, and various birdlife. Supported by council's Enviroplan Levy and the Landholder Conservation Partnerships Program, the initiative included tree planting, weed management, and ecological restoration. The covenant also contributed to broader conservation efforts across Ipswich, which have protected approximately 6,900 hectares of land through similar agreements.

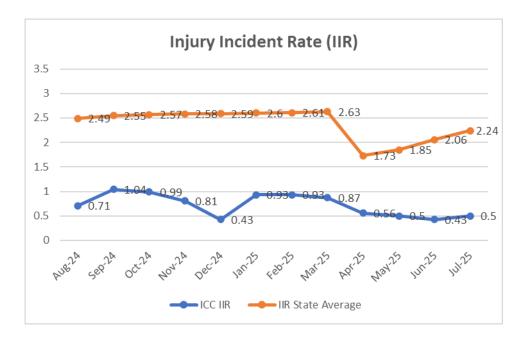

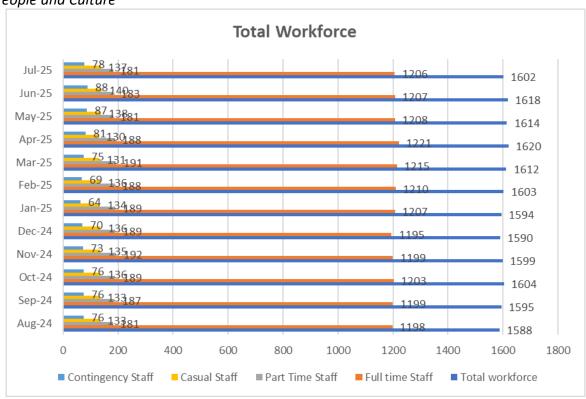

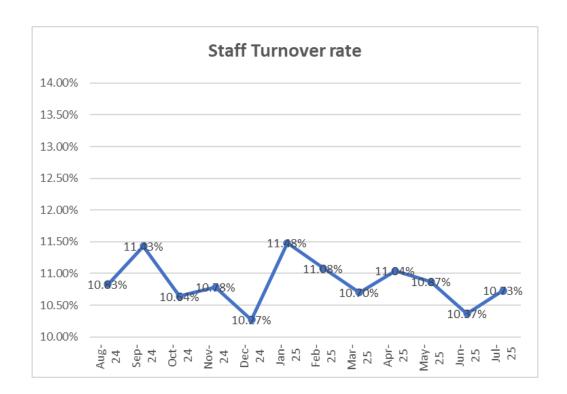

## 4. Major Key Performance Indicators

People and Culture



The total workforce for the council organisation 'head count' was 1602 in July 2025.



Staff turnover rate was at 10.73% in July 2025, up by 0.36% from June 2025.

For interest, but not direct comparison due to the time and calculation differential, the annual average workforce attrition rate for South-East Queensland councils for 2023 reported by the LGAQ was 16%.

#### **Finance**

The full financial performance report for July 2025 has been provided to the Council Ordinary Meeting as a separate report.

As at 31 July 2025, Council recorded a net surplus of \$11.6 million, compared to the year-to-date (YTD) budgeted surplus of \$16.1 million. The YTD operating result, excluding the infrastructure levy, is a deficit of \$1.9 million, against a budgeted surplus of \$3.6 million. This variance is mainly due to \$4.2 million of the 2025-2026 Financial Assistance Grant being paid in the prior financial year. There was also over budget expenditure on employee expenses, as well as less spending on materials and services which is due to the timing of expenditure.

Capital expenditure (excluding flood buy back and disaster recovery) totalled \$6.8 million, compared to a full-year budget of \$4.8 million.

Capital Delivery Program 2025-2026

A solid commencement to the new financial year capital delivery program with an actual spend of \$5.351 million versus a budget of \$2.782 million.

The additional expenditure primarily resulted from early commencement on projects such as Purga School Road bridge replacement and early purchase of culverts and materials for the Adelong Avenue rehabilitation project.

## 5. Risk and Compliance Update

## Corporate Risk Register

Council's corporate risk register is reviewed every two months at the Executive Leadership Team (ELT) Risk Committee meeting. Council's corporate risk register will be reviewed at the ELT Risk Committee meeting to be held on 14 August 2025, with amendments agreed to, areas of responsibility, key mitigations, action plans and milestone progress.

Council's corporate risk register and risk trends in these risks are reported through Council's Audit and Risk Management Committee (ARMC) which is held every quarter. The corporate risk register and risk trends in these risks are also circulated to all Councillors on a regular basis.

Council continues to seek to actively manage and mitigate its corporate risks.

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## Legal Matters

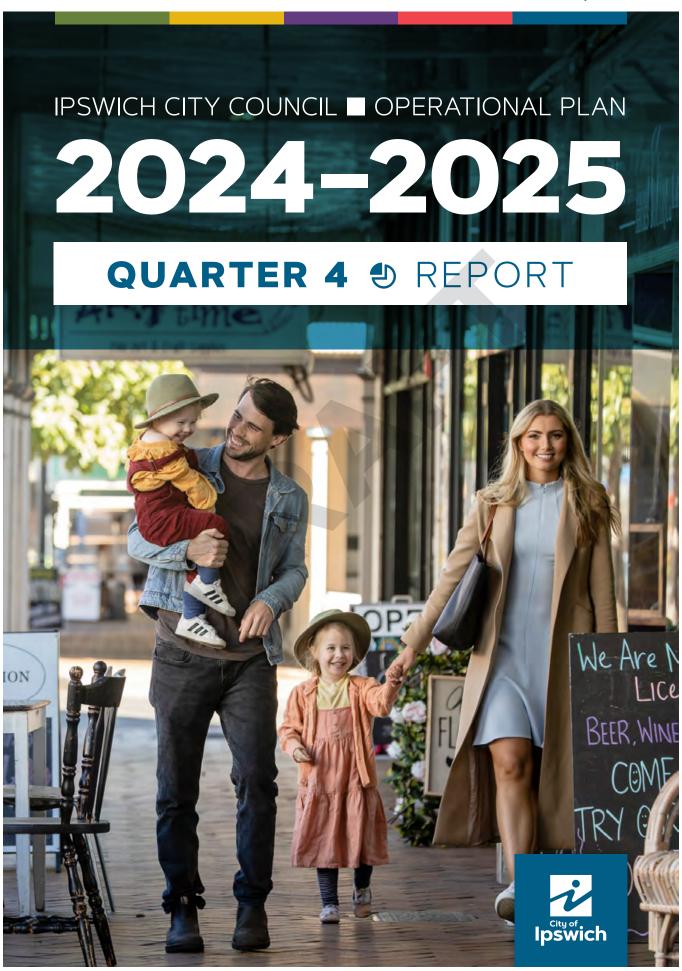

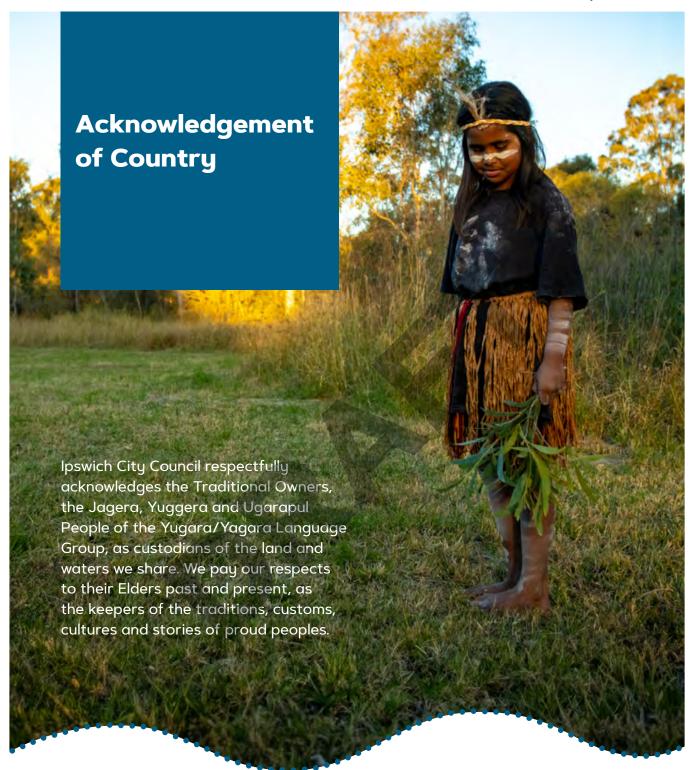

# THE ROLE AND FUNCTIONS OF COUNCILS

#### What is local government?

A local government (or local council) provides a wide range of services and activities. Seventy-seven councils across Queensland contribute around \$7.4 billion to the state economy every year.

Councils have a much wider and more important role than many people realise. A council enables the economic, social and cultural development of the local government area (LGA) it represents, supports individuals and groups, and provides a wide range of services for the wellbeing of the community. It also plays an important role in community governance and enforces various federal, state and local laws for its communities.

State Government Acts of Parliament define the powers of local councils. In Queensland that's the *Local Government Act 2009* (the Act). A number of factors, including the availability of funds, the size, location and demographics of the area, the commitment to maintain existing services, and the views, wishes and needs of the community, shapes the range and quality of services provided by a council.

The services provided by council fall under five broad categories:

- 1. Planning for sustainable development: councils play a role in providing long-term strategic planning for local government areas, as well as in town planning, zoning and subdivisions. In addition, councils are responsible for processing most development applications, building site and compliance inspections and building regulations.
- 2. Providing and maintaining infrastructure: providing local infrastructure is an important contribution councils make to their communities. For example, councils provide and maintain local roads and bridges, public car parks, footpaths, sporting fields, parks, libraries and art galleries. Councils must consult with their communities about providing and maintaining these assets.
- 3. Protecting the environment: councils regularly assess the state of their local environments, provide environmental programs and use their regulatory powers to prevent pollution or restore degraded environments. They carry out activities such as garbage collection and recycling, street cleaning, regulating parking, controlling dogs and cats, and eradicating noxious weeds.
- 4. Providing community services and development: councils consult with and assess the needs of their communities and use the information to target community development activities. They provide a range of services, including some aimed at groups in the community with special needs. Community services include libraries, home care services, swimming pools, playground facilities and sporting grounds and facilities.
- 5. Safeguarding public health: councils help maintain high standards of public health and reduce the risk of exposure to a wide range of diseases through activities such as inspections of cafes and restaurants, waste management, pest and vermin control and hazardous material containment.

#### The three levels of government

Local government does not exist in isolation – it's one of three levels of government in Australia. It is important for councils to maintain strong relationships across these different levels of government, as each play distinct and important roles.

**Please note:** while many councils deliver their own water and sewerage services, in Ipswich this is managed by Urban Utilities (UU). UU is one of the largest water distributor-retailers in Australia, supplying drinking water, recycled water and sewerage services to a population of more than 1.4 million throughout South East Queensland. #### The Federal Government:

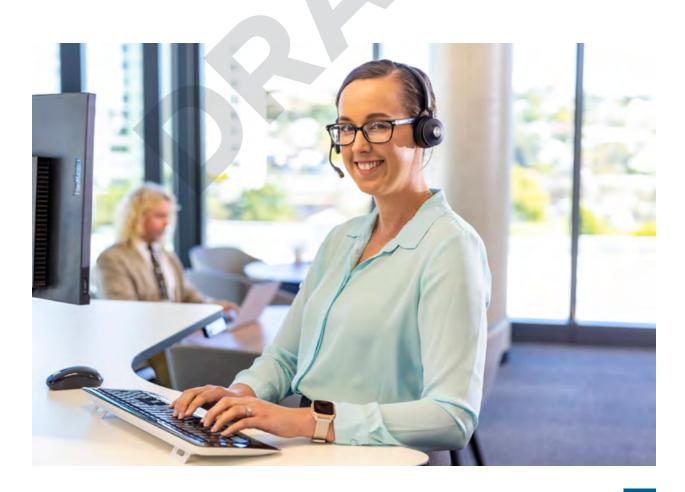
- raises money to run the country by collecting taxes on incomes, goods and services and company profits and spends it on national matters. For example; trade, defence, immigration and the environment
- has broad national powers, among other things, it administers laws in relation to defence, immigration, foreign affairs, trade, postal services and taxation.

#### **State Governments:**

- raise money from taxes but receive more than half their money from the Federal Government to spend on state/territory matters. For example; schools, housing and hospitals, roads and railways, police and ambulance services
- have the power to look after laws not covered by the Federal Government for instance, land use planning, hospitals, schools, police and housing services.

#### Local Governments (councils):

 collect taxes (rates) from local property owners and receive grants from federal and state/territory governments and spend this on local matters for example; town planning, rubbish collection, local roads and pest control.

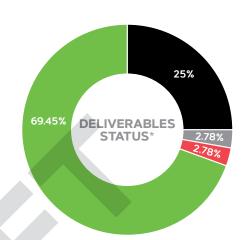

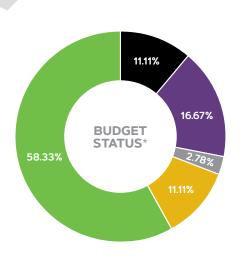

#### 2.MAJOR HIGHLIGHTS OF OPERATIONAL ACTIVITIES

#### 2.1 Highlights

The following is a summary of major highlights that occurred within Ipswich Waste Services (IWS) for the period April to June 2025.

#### **Waste and Resource Recovery Programs**

Citywide garden organics (GO) bin roll out underway with over 90% of eligible households already having received a bin for supporting commencement a three-bin standard service from 1 July. Communication, engagement and education has significantly progressed with Stage 1 and 2 of the council led communication campaign delivered.

The Let's Get it Sorted Program (LGIS) continued with education materials distributed, pop up events conducted and the establishment of a multi-unit dwelling recycling improvement trial. Preparations for the second stage communication campaign are well underway, with messaging built around the outcomes of community engagement and waste audit data.

#### **Capital Projects**

Significant progress continues to be made on many capital projects, enhancing Council's ability to meet the resource recovery needs of the community. Key highlights include:

Riverview RRC general waste pit wall relining and rebuild of the access ramp underway.

Completion of Southern Resource Recovery Centre geotechnical investigation and progressing to scoping groundworks treatment strategies and a revised groundworks estimate.

Commencement of the construction of the new gatehouse at Rosewood RRC and completion of overhead powerline install and associated electrical works.

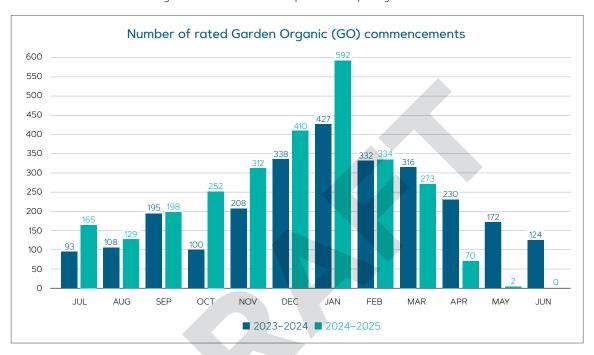

#### 2.2 Garden Organics (GO) Service

Opt-in GO bin commencements ceased at the end of quarter 3 to support planning for inclusion in councils standard collection service, however, 64 new services were processed during April due to system update lags and minor process gaps. Any other new properties that came on line in quarter 4 have been captured and will have GO bins delivered in early quarter 1 2025–2026.

A total of **32,163** services were rated for the domestic green waste bin as at the end of quarter 4 2024–2025. Figure 1 below demonstrates the annual growth of new GO bins compared to the prior year.



#### 2.3 Domestic Waste (Refuse and Recycling)

A total of **95,807** charges were rated for the waste services as of 30 June 2025. Figure 2 displays the increases in rated services for the year, compared to the same period the previous year.

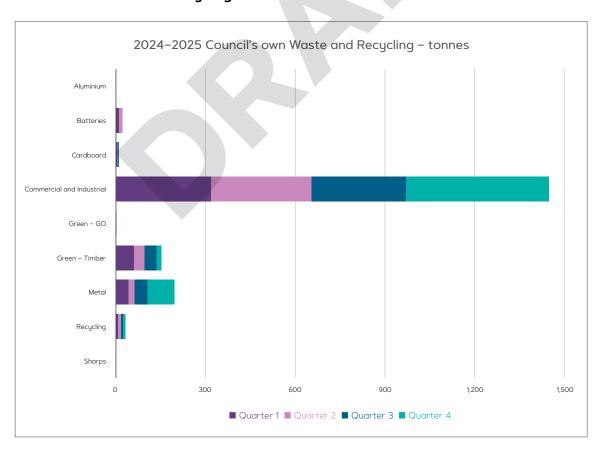
#### Conclusion

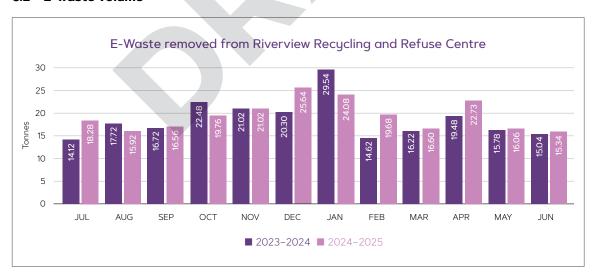


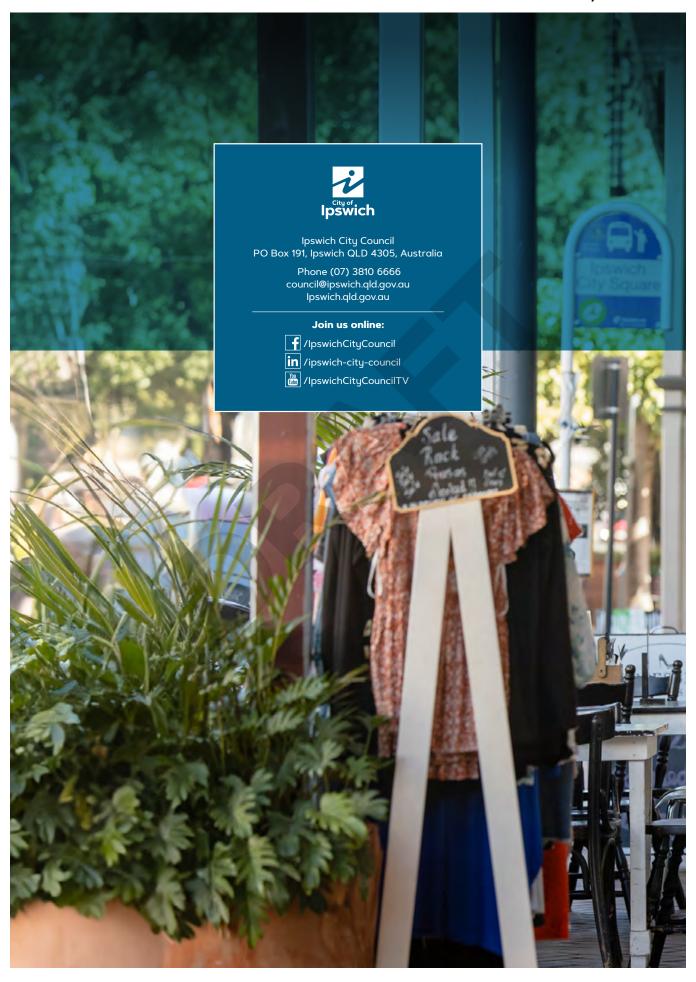

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

This is a report concerning Ipswich City Council's (**Council**) financial performance for the period ending 31 July 2025, submitted in accordance with section 204 of the *Local Government Regulation 2012*.

#### **RECOMMENDATION/S**

That the report on Council's financial performance for the period ending 31 July 2025, submitted in accordance with section 204 of the *Local Government Regulation 2012*, be considered and noted by Council.

#### **PURPOSE OF REPORT/BACKGROUND**

This report outlines the financial results for Ipswich City Council as of 31 July 2025.

The total net result (including capital revenue) for Council as of 31 July 2025 is a surplus of \$11.6 million compared to the year to date (YTD) budget surplus of \$16.1 million.

Council's YTD operating deficit excluding infrastructure levy is a \$1.9 million deficit compared to a budgeted surplus of \$3.6 million. The explanations are outlined further in the report.

Capital expenditure year-to-date, excluding asset donations, the Voluntary Home Buy-Back program, and disaster recovery, is \$2 million above budget, including the Nicholas Street Redevelopment. As of 31 July 2025, asset donations are \$819k above the year-to-date budget.

#### Revenue

Operating revenue is \$6.2 million below the year-to-date budget, primarily due to operational grants being \$7.7 million under budget. This shortfall is primarily attributed \$4.1 million of the Financial Assistance Grant being recognised in the prior financial year, as well timing variance for the reminder of the grant.

Rates revenue was above budget by \$447k which is mainly due to less on time payment discounts being recognised, this variance is expected to moderate over the coming months. Interest revenue was above budget by \$355k and fees and charges were above budget by \$318k.

#### Expenses

Overall operating expenses were \$702k below the YTD budget.

Employee expenses (including labour contracts) were over budget by \$562k. This is largely due to EBA increase on estimated leave balances being higher than forecasted during budget development.

Materials and services (excluding labour contracts) are \$1.5 million under budget, primarily due to timing differences in expenditure. The remaining annual budget is currently under review to better align with forecasted spending.

Depreciation, which is a non-cash item, is over budget by \$102k YTD.

#### Capital

The total full year capital expenditure (including the Nicholas Street Redevelopment and excluding Asset donations, the Voluntary Home Buy Back and Disaster Recovery) is \$6.8 million compared to the full year budget of \$4.8 million.

The Nicholas Street Precinct Redevelopment is below the YTD budget by approximately \$221k predominantly due to deferral of tenant incentive payments for Venue, and Tulmur Walk.

Asset and Infrastructure Services Infrastructure Program YTD capital expenditure (excluding Voluntary Home Buy Back and Disaster Recovery) is \$5.4 million compared to budget of \$2.8 million. Overspends were mainly due to Bridge and Culvert Rehabilitation on Purga School Rd Bridge, sealed Road Rehabilitation on Adelong Avenue works and Drainage Rehabilitation on Champions Way drainage project. Strategic Transport was underspent on Springfield Parkway Stage 2 with the July claim expected in August.

Environment and Sustainability Department for the full year was overspent by \$114k. Enviroplan was overspent mainly related to works at Flinders-Goolman Conservation Estate.

#### Cash Balances

Council's cash and cash equivalents balance as at 31 July 2025 was \$165.9 million and above forecasts.

#### **LEGAL IMPLICATIONS**

This report and its recommendations are consistent with the following legislative provisions: *Local Government Regulation 2012* 

#### **POLICY IMPLICATIONS**

Council's financial position is managed in accordance with the Financial Management Policy.

#### **RISK MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS**

The operating result of a \$1.5 million deficit against a budgeted surplus of \$4.1 million is mainly driven by lower operating grants revenue received and higher employee expenses (including labour contracts). Materials and services expenditure will continue to be monitored.

The higher than budgeted spending on employee expenses represents an ongoing risk for the 2025-2026 financial year. Employee expenses will continue to be monitored and reported on.

The regular review of council's financial reports on a monthly basis will continue to be an important part of council's governance processes.

#### FINANCIAL/RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

There are no specific financial implications as a result of this report.

#### **COMMUNITY AND OTHER CONSULTATION**

The contents of this report did not require any community consultation. Analysis and explanations of the variances are undertaken in conjunction with the various departments.

This is a joint Notice of Motion from Mayor Teresa Harding and Deputy Mayor Nicole Jonic seeking Council's approval for Deputy Mayor Nicole Jonic to participate in the Council of Mayors (SEQ) International Delegation to the 2025 Asia Pacific Cities Summit and Mayors' Forum (APCS) in Dubai.

APCS brings together mayors, city leaders, policy makers, business leaders, academics and industry professionals to explore the challenges and opportunities facing cities across the Asia Pacific region.

The Summit is an initiative of Brisbane City Council and is held every two years, with the 2023 event attracting almost 1,200 delegates including 171 cities and 118 mayors, deputy mayors and equivalents.

This includes complimentary air travel and registration, with the Council of Mayors (SEQ) covering accommodation and other associated travel arrangements.

While this invitation was extended to Mayor Harding as a Board Director of the Council of Mayors (SEQ), it can be transferred to Deputy Mayor Jonic as an Alternate Director of the Council of Mayors (SEQ) and with the agreement of Mayor Harding.

This delegation will take place from Thursday 23 October 2025 to Friday 31 October 2025 which will include participation in the 2025 APCS (27 to 29 October) as well as relevant site visits and meetings taking place before and after the Summit. Six SEQ councils have already confirmed their participation in the delegation, including host Brisbane City Council.
