5893 Springfield Parkway Road St 2 Road Duplication

Current Status:

Tender package is currently in the market with a closing date of Tuesday 17 March

- Assessment of tenders and shortlisting to 2 competitive tenderers – 1 April 2026
- Construction Methodology meeting with contractors - 21 April 2026
- Risk & Commercial Conditions meeting - 28 April 2026
- Consensus meeting for preferred contractor - 10 June 2026
- Council Meeting recommendation to award - 30 July 2026



Marie St, Goodna

Current Status:

Works to be completed by end March 2026

- Significant bank slippage in March 2022 rain event
- Rectification work approved for QRA funding - approximately \$1.15mill
- Significant design work required to stabilise embankment prior to construction commencing
- Design required relocation of Urban Utilities water main and Energex overhead wires
- Site damaged again during ex-TC Alfred impacts in 2025
- Further work on embankment and water main required – additional \$1.1mill
- Additional funding being sought from QRA – no decision as yet.

Ripley Road & Fischer Road

Current Status:

Energex have completed the relocation of poles and overhead wires between Cunningham Hwy and Monterey Dve

- Bielby commenced works on site, will increase activity over coming weeks
- Resolution of treatments / offsets for potential koala habitat is progressing through Dept Climate Change, Energy, Environment and Water (DCCEEW)
- Expect conditions to be received July 2026. E&S are already working through the offset site
- Once conditions received, not expecting any significant disruption to delivery program
- Property acquisition process is continuing well. 2x residential owners have agreed to financial terms.
- One development site is close to agreeing terms
- Others are negotiating but are some way apart



Ripley Road & Reif Street Intersection Upgrade

Current Status:

Energex, Telstra, NBN & Optus relocations over past 6 – 8 months

- Contractor (Allencon) commencing work late March 2026
- Meeting with QTMR regarding on-ramp traffic conditions including mandatory nightwork
- On-going discussions with directly affected residents

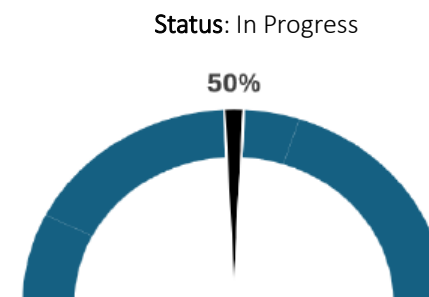


OF NOTE:

- Mowing-related service requests increased by 165% from 2023 to 2025, showing high demand growth.
- The 'Snap, Send, Solve' app simplifies service submissions, contributing to increased engagement and requests.
- Peaks in service requests typically occur in the weeks/months following heavy rainfall.
- Delivery against the Open Space Maintenance Action Plan shifted from 25% in September 2025, to 50% as at end December 2025.








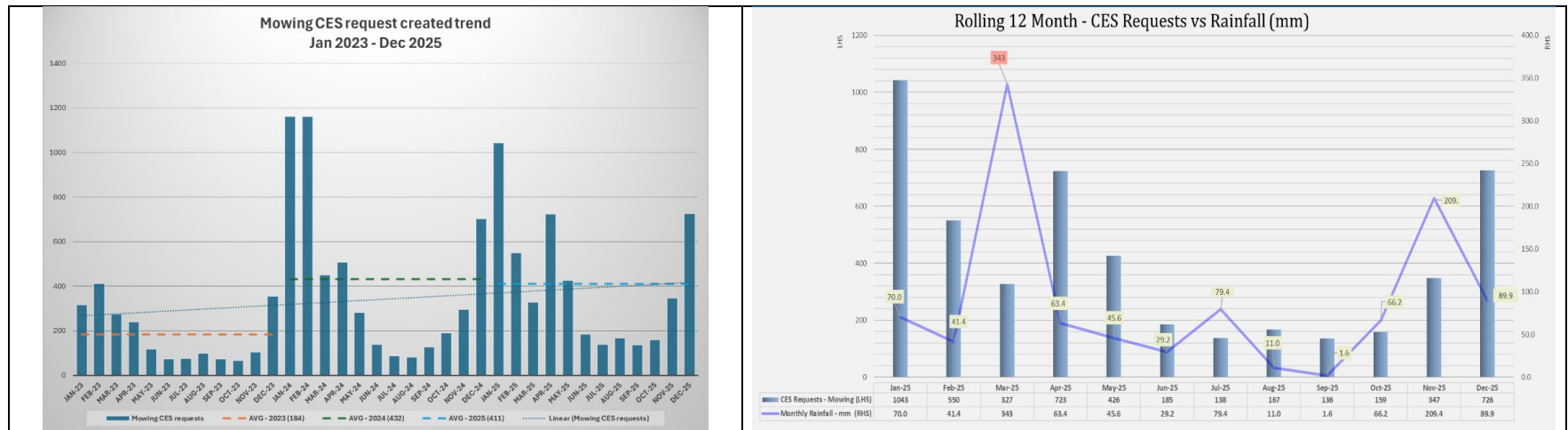

1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

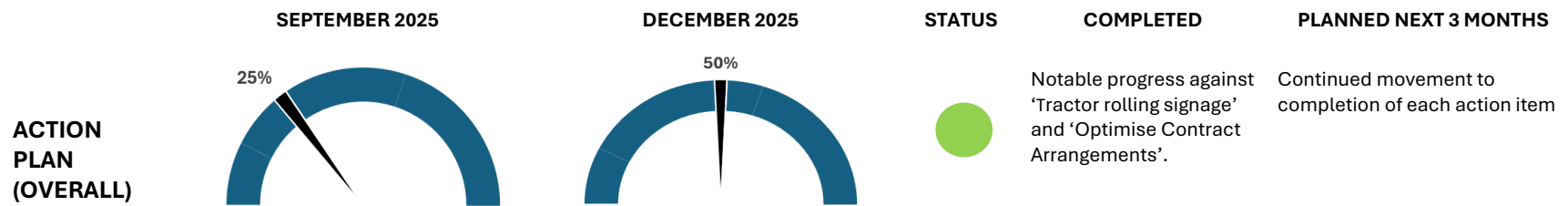
Community expectation for well-maintained open spaces continues, noting a 223% increase in monthly average CES requests for mowing CES requests between 2023 (average 184 per month) to 2025 (average 411 per month). Linear trend shows persistent growth in CES requests. Key contributors include the integration of programmed work with customer works (via CES platform) and community take up of Snap, Send and Solve to quickly and easily raise service requests.

Peaks in customer service requests typically peak in the weeks/ monthly following heavy rainfall. In the last quarter, rainfall volumes increased as expected, due to the summer rain season commencing in October 2025.



2. OPEN SPACE ACTION PLAN PERFORMANCE

This report outlines progress on the Open Space Maintenance Action Plan, addressing service delivery efficiency, resource optimisation, and readiness for future growth. It highlights key operational improvements, identifies strategic risks, and outlines next steps to ensure sustainable service delivery across the city.

Dear Mayor Harding and Ipswich City Council,

Please find attached the community petition requesting a pedestrian crossing on Jones Road, Bellbird Park, for tabling at the next Ipswich City Council meeting.

I am writing to present a formal petition with over 160 local signatures calling for the urgent installation of a pedestrian crossing on Jones Road, Bellbird Park, directly across from the Redbank Plains Scout Den (90 Jones Road).

This petition arises from ongoing community concern and prior correspondence regarding Service Requests 250923-000267 and 250923-000257. Despite multiple reports and assessments, Council has concluded that current pedestrian activity "does not align with the criteria" for a crossing.

With respect, the residents of Bellbird Park strongly disagree.
This area is used daily by:

Daycare groups crossing twice daily with toddlers in 4-seater prams for Bush Kindy sessions;

Families and Scouts attending evening and weekend programs at the Scout Den;

Students from Bellbird Park State School and Redbank Plains State High walking to and from school.

There is no existing pedestrian crossing, poor visibility, and unsafe alternate routes. This is an immediate child safety risk.

Our community pays rates and taxes, and it should not be difficult to prioritise basic safety, painting crossing lines on a road where children and families cross every day should not require years of review or deferral. This is a simple, low-cost action that could save lives.

We respectfully request that:

1. This petition be formally tabled at the next Ipswich City Council meeting and referred for urgent reassessment;
2. A site inspection and community meeting be arranged with Council representatives to observe pedestrian activity; and
3. Interim safety measures (temporary signage, reduced speed limits, or a painted crossing) be implemented while long-term options are reviewed.

The community has done its part, we have gathered support, documented risks, and reached out repeatedly. Now we ask that Council act before a preventable accident occurs.

Thank you for your time and commitment to the Ipswich community. I look forward to confirmation that this petition will be tabled and discussed at the next available Council meeting.

Thank you for your reply and for considering my request regarding a pedestrian crossing on Jones Road near the Redbank Plains Scout Den. I appreciate the explanation provided around the current assessment.

Following your response, I am reaching out to the local daycares, the Scout group, and the wider Bellbird Park community to encourage them to contact Council directly and express their own concerns. This location is used regularly, the daycare, for example, takes children to the Scout Den twice a day for Bush Kindy. With no pedestrian crossing available, families and educators are left with no safe way to cross. The nearby intersections (at Augusta Parkway/Redbank Plains Road and the local school) are not viable alternatives, as there is no continuous footpath leading all the way down to the Scout Den.

Thank you for your email requesting support for a pedestrian crossing on Jones Road, Bellbird Park directly across from Redbank Plains Scout Facility- 90 Jones Road, Redbank Plains.

As this matter is operational, it is for qualified Officers of the Traffic and Transport Team to assess the request against set criteria to determine if the location meets the requirements for a pedestrian crossing. Council officers investigated your request 250923-000257 and after assessment, it was deemed that the current pedestrian activity did not align with the criteria for installing a pedestrian crossing. Pedestrian demand at this location was limited to specific times and activities and based on the review of all known factors at the location, a pedestrian crossing at this stage is not justified.

Council will continue to monitor the location for pedestrian demand and will reassess again in the future if required.

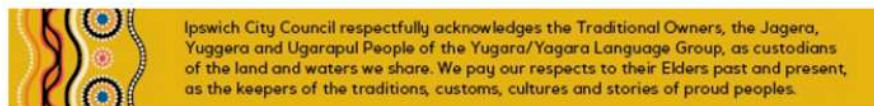

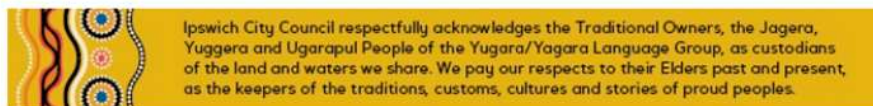

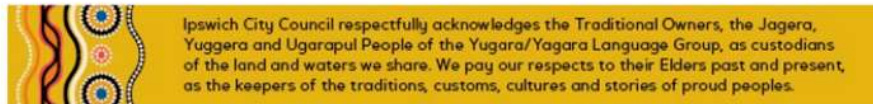

Dear Councillor Martin,

I am writing to you regarding serious pedestrian safety concerns along Jones Road, particularly near the Redbank Plains Scout Den. This relates to Service Request Number 250923-000267, which I submitted to Council earlier this month.

While I appreciate the response I received from Council officers, the decision not to proceed with a zebra crossing at this stage is deeply concerning. The reality is that children, families, and community members are regularly crossing this section of road without any safe infrastructure in place.

For context:

My two children attend a local centre that takes groups to the Scout Den twice a day for Bush Kindy. With no safe crossing, educators are forced to cross directly at the Den with toddlers and nursery children in 4-seater pram buggies. The alternative route via the school lights is unsafe due to bushland, snakes (especially in warmer months), uneven ground, and no continuous footpath.

Local parents have also raised that Bellbird Park State School and Redbank Plains State High students face risks daily when walking to and from school.

The Goodna end of Jones Road is particularly hazardous — bins on collection days obstruct what little path exists, the footpath leans towards the road, and overgrown vegetation limits visibility and safe passage.

Community members are calling for:

A zebra crossing directly across from the Scout Den.

Footpath improvements to ensure safe and continuous pedestrian access.

Vegetation maintenance along the roadside to prevent hazards.

This is not just an inconvenience — it is a matter of child safety. The community sentiment is strong, and parents are beginning to mobilise. Several families and local groups are contacting Council, referencing my service request number, to demonstrate the real pedestrian demand in this area.

If you would like to see this concern firsthand, I encourage you to review the comments on the Bellbird Park Community Facebook page, where many residents have shared their experiences and frustrations regarding the state of pedestrian safety along Jones Road.

I respectfully request your support in raising this issue further within Council and advocating for immediate improvements. Even a simple zebra crossing and better path maintenance would make a significant difference to safety.

Would it be possible to arrange a community meeting on site with yourself, families, and local groups such as the Scouts and the daycare centre to discuss solutions? Seeing firsthand how frequently this area is used may help highlight the urgency.

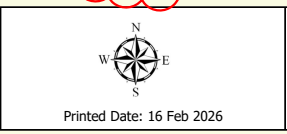
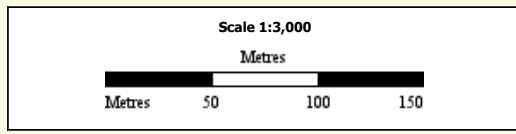

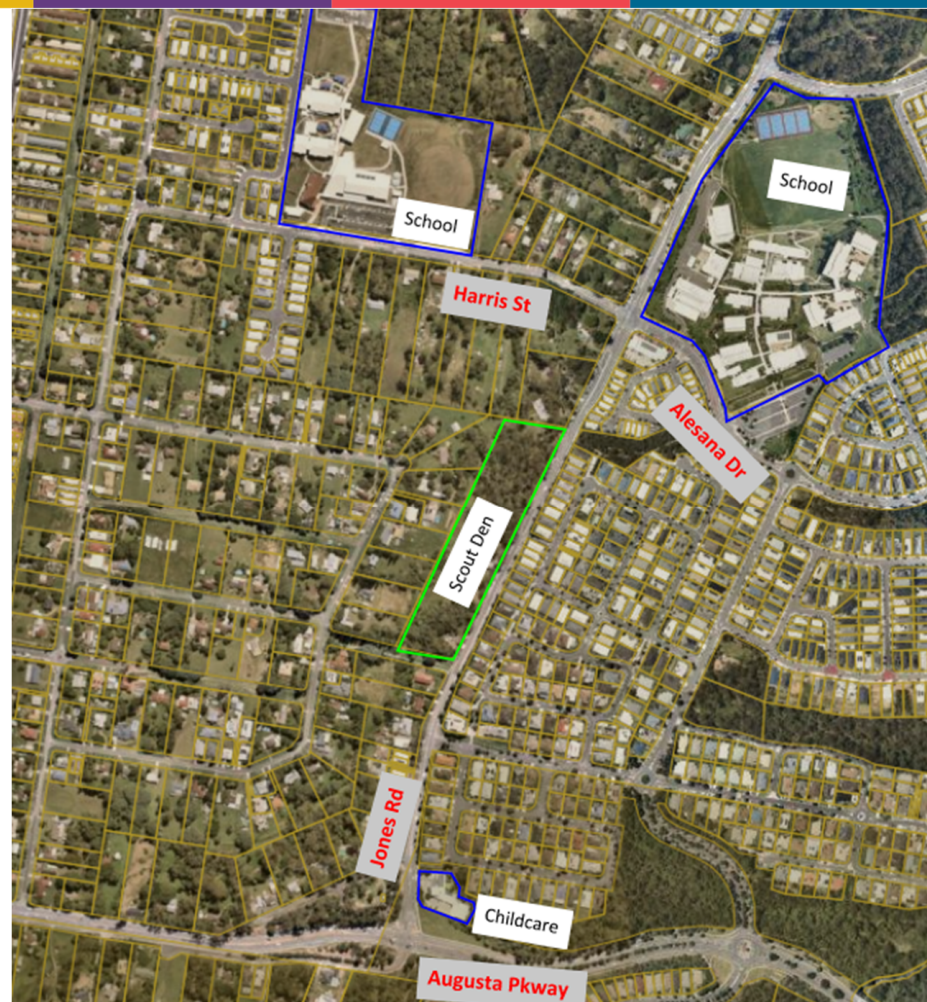
The purpose of this presentation is to discuss the petition that was received regarding the installation of a pedestrian crossing on Jones Road, Bellbird Park

Petition Details

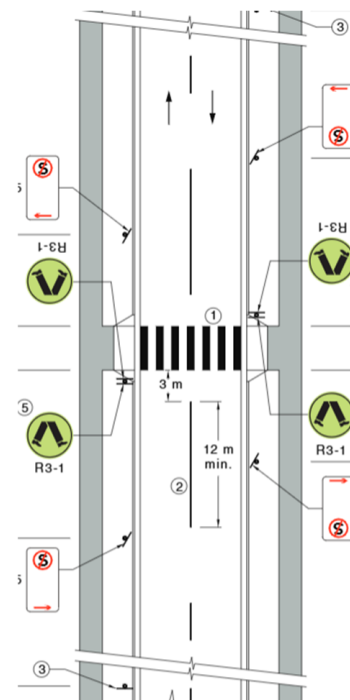

Council Assessment of Pedestrian Crossing request

A review of various items and road elements need to be considered for a pedestrian crossing (and assessed in accordance with prescribed Australian Standards). These include:


- Road hierarchy
- Existing speed environment
- Traffic volumes
- Pedestrian demand
- Road environment
- Crash history
- Infrastructure requirements
- Strategic alignment with future road requirements





Council Assessment of Pedestrian Crossing request

Council assessment outcome:

- 
- Jones Road is a sub-arterial road and posted at 60km/h
 - A pedestrian crossing would not improve pedestrian safety under existing conditions (high speed / high volume road)
 - Extensive and costly infrastructure upgrades would be required (including a raised pedestrian platform crossing)
 - Site distance improvements and missing footpath links would be required to facilitate compliance
 - Impact on current parking for the Scout Den
 - Overall, Council officers do not recommend the installation of a pedestrian crossing on Jones Road

Proposed Improvement



- As children may be present, warning signs are proposed to be installed on Jones Road in vicinity to the Redbank Plains Scout Den
- The warning signs are proposed on both the northern and southern side of Jones Road as a safety improvement measure to increase motorist awareness

Summary

- Council received a petition for a pedestrian crossing on Jones Road, Redbank Plains
- A review of various road elements have been undertaken in accordance with the relevant Australian Standards
- Based on a review by Council officers, it is not recommended to install a pedestrian crossing on Jones Road, Bellbird Park
- Council propose to install some warning signs as a safety measure to increase motorist awareness
